

Route 238 (Mission Blvd.) Project

Activities / Communication

The FWPNA General Membership meeting is held once a year. Association officers and board members are elected, and annual dues are established at this meeting. Other meetings are scheduled as needed to develop and affirm neighborhood action plans, and to deal with "hot topics" when they arise. City staff, local businesses, and service organizations (all neighborhood stakeholders) are invited to participate.

The Association maintains email and postal mailing lists, and sends out communications to its members regarding neighborhood developments, events, activities, and projects. Association members with email receive notices and information on city topics that impact our neighborhood as they occur. Members without email are offered the opportunity to "buddy" with members that have email in order to stay informed; otherwise they only receive notices in the mail about neighborhood meetings.

As part of the next phase of the Route 238 Corridor Improvement Project, the City will be improving Mission Blvd, south of Industrial to the City limits. The project scope for Mission Boulevard will include new pavement, streetlights, landscaping, sidewalks and undergrounding overhead utilities. Additionally, a traffic signal is proposed at Mission and Blanche. One of the issues in which the community has expressed a concern is the issue of noise along Mission Blvd. Although installation of a sound wall along the west side of Mission Boulevard does not currently seem financially feasible, as part of the environ-

mental document, the City will review and consider that option.

The timing for installing the improvements is dependent upon the sale of the surplus right-of-way for the Route 238 Bypass, which will fund the design and construction of this project. However, the latest projections for startup are at least 3 to 5 years away.

Due to this delay in improvements the association and City are working together on an interim project to improve the appearance of the west side of Mission Blvd. See the article below on the successful first phase.

Fairway Park Community Volunteer Planting Project Saturday, December 3, 2011

On Saturday, December 3, 2011, Fairway Park Community came together with City of Hayward (CoH) Landscape Maintenance staff to plant 75 Oleander shrubs. Everyone met at the corner of Blanche and Mission to work on this joint effort to beautify the Fairway Park neighborhood landscape. There were a total of 34 Fairway Park Community members including sen-

iors, Boys Scouts, little ones in a stroller with pom poms cheering others on, parents with their children, and singles that helped in this project.

With the major prep work done by the City staff prior to our morning planting and due to the many volunteers participating all the oleanders were planted in an amazing one hour!


Special thanks go out to Pastor Eldred of the Fairway Park Baptist Church for opening up the church's library to us to gather in afterwards and celebrate our efforts and
